2025 Advent Reflections

This Advent we are using some hymns to reflect on the meaning of Advent. You may begin by reading the hymn for the week, then each day reflect on one of the verses, or you may like to set aside some time once a week to reflect on the words of the hymn. Each week there are some suggestions of some activities that you may like to be involved with, and a prayer for the week.

Week 1. Reflecting on our Lord's Return.

This week our hymn is O Come, O Come, Emmanuel. Our diocesan theme in this our anniversary year has been "Looking back, Moving Forward." This ancient hymn invites us to look back to some OT prophesies of the coming of the Messiah, as well as looking forward to Jesus' birth and his coming again in glory.
