INTRODUCTION

"Each year, from 1 September, the Global Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, to 4 October, St Francis of Assisi Day, many Anglicans use the Season of Creation – also known as Creation Time – to pray and celebrate with creation, focus on the story of Earth, and commit to a ministry of healing Earth."

As part of this ecumenical effort, the Diocese of Ballarat is encouraging parishes to mark the season with a Harvest Festival, or themed prayers during the season.

THE SERVICE OF THE WORD

After the first reading, the following may be said or sung: Hear the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

The psalm or canticle follows the first reading and the following may be used in place of the psalm of the day:

The earth has yielded its harvest; **God, our God, has blessed us.** You visit the earth and water it; **you make it very plenteous.**

You soften the ground with showers; and bless the increase of it.

You crown the year with your goodness; and your paths overflow with plenty.

The meadows are clothed with sheep; the valleys stand so thick with corn, they shout for joy and sing.

The earth has yielded its harvest; **God, our God, has blessed us.** cf Psalm 65.8, 10,11,13; 67.7

Perhaps the simplest way to mark this time is to incorporate Harvest intercessions into your standard Sunday service. You have three primary options here:

Option 1: Occasional Prayers from A Prayer Book for Australia, especially:

We thank you, God of all loveliness, for the beauty of earth and sky and sea; for the richness of mountains, deserts and rivers; for the songs of birds and the beauty of flowers. We praise you for these good gifts, and pray that we may guard our heritage, to the honour and glory of your name. *Amen*.

Option 2: Creation Themed Resources from the Anglican Church of Australia

Traditional Language Collects

Episcopal Book of Common Prayer (2007) Prayers for Various Occasions—Sections 19, 24, 25

I. For fruitful seasons

Almighty God, Lord of heaven and earth: We humbly pray that thy gracious providence may give and preserve to our use the harvests of the land and of the seas, and may prosper all who labor to gather them, that we, who constantly receive good things from thy hand, may always give thee thanks; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

II. For Commerce and Industry

Almighty God, whose Son Jesus Christ in his earthly life shared our toil and hallowed our labor: Be present with thy people where they work; make those who carry on the industries and commerce of this land responsive to thy will; and give to us all a pride in what we do, and a just return for our labor; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen*.

III. For stewardship of creation

O merciful Creator, thy hand is open wide to satisfy the needs of every living creature: Make us, we beseech thee, ever thankful for thy loving providence; and grant that we, remembering the account that we must one day give, may be faithful stewards of thy good gifts; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with thee and the Holy Spirit liveth and reigneth, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

For Vocation in Daily Work

Almighty God our heavenly Father, who declarest thy glory and showest forth thy handiwork in the heavens and in the earth: Deliver us, we beseech thee, in our various occupations from the service of self alone, that we may do the work which thou givest us to do in truth and beauty and for the common good; for the sake of him who came among us as one that serveth, thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

For Labor Day
