CHILDREN'S MINISTRY SUGGESTIONS

The Challenge

Many smaller congregations seek to welcome and support children, but don't have them every week, and/or they may visit at unexpected times. Here are a few ideas to help your church be ready for children, without high costs or creating unnecessary work.

1. Create a Simple Children's Area

A welcoming space shows families they are valued, even if children aren't present every week. Consider children-sized tables and a few chairs along with a mat or small carpet where babies can play to delineate the area. If the space is inviting, children will immediately recognise this as their area, and which helps them to feel like they have a place at your church.

Promote the Space:

- Mention that this space is available your service sheet, website, and Facebook page.
- Announce verbally at larger services, e.g., Christmas, Baptisms.
- One Ballarat Congregation uses the words: "Please sit anywhere you wish in the church and/or use our children's area at any time. If you have young children, know that they are always welcome at church. You are making an important effort by attending as a family.

Keep it Simple & Uncluttered:

- Silent toys Ideally a felt or knitted nativity set or Noah's Ark if you have one, but if not a
 few washable good quality toys like beanie bears or teddies works too. Clean and
 complete toys communicate that you take this area seriously if it is out-dated, broken,
 incomplete or potentially unsafe just remove it.
 - Avoid noisy toys or those that encourage running (e.g. race cars with sound effects). Even wooden or plastic toys can be noisy in little hands, and parents may not be able to worship as they are worried about their children disrupting the service.
- Twistable crayons are a great option to provide permanently (avoiding blunt pencils, broken crayons, or dried-out textas).
- Christian stickers for special occasions.
 - The Faith That Sticks series (https://koorong.com/search?q=faith%20that%20sticks) is a great option. Consider purchasing a few sets that appeal to you and keeping a few complete sheets in the priest's prayer desk (excellent if a child unexpectedly announces it's their birthday!), and some others available for the Sidespersons or volunteers keeping an eye on the children's area to bring out for special occasions or if a larger number of children arrive.
 - If you are looking for professional Christmas or Easter stickers, Illustrated Ministry (https://www.illustratedministry.com) create high quality vinyl stickers with downloadable backgrounds - they even easily peel off pews without damage! However do be note that they have a progressive focus in some of their other materials – so focus on the Christmas and Easter stickers, and colouring-in sheets.

Books for Quiet Time:

- Any children's Bible that you prefer.
- Consider carefully the books that are provided and limit the options on a Sunday morning.
 You do not need to provide many options and they should facilitate the worship, not distract from it.

2. Seasonal Colouring Sheets

If your parish does not regularly have children attending, consider colouring-in sheets based on church seasons rather than needing to change them weekly if no children attend.

To assist you with this ministry, the Ministry Development Committee of the Diocese of Ballarat has produced a document that collects ~40 sample colouring sheets, which is available through the Diocese.

Note: If you do end up with children weekly, then lectionary-based colouring sheets are a sensible option (and provide variation while keeping the rest of the children's area the same week by week). 3. Special Services - Be Prepared!

When you know that extra families and children may attend (e.g., Baptisms, Easter, Christmas):

- Offer a short children's talk but be careful not to put children or their parents on the spot
 to participate if they prefer not to. E.g. Newer children may prefer to stay with their
 parents rather than come to the front or answer questions.
- Remind families the children's area is available, and that they may use it anytime.

EXTRA TIP! If you are regularly leading services, consider drafting two or three short 2 minute children's talks that you can use on any occasion if children visit unexpectedly –keep one typed up and available with your prayer book – Good topics that can work on any Sunday include – What is the Lord's Prayer? What do the priest's vestments mean? What Colour and Season are we in this Sunday?, Why do we have a Sanctuary lamp or Gospel book? Etc.

4. Extra Practical Touches

- Baby Change Table: Let visitors know where it is—include this info in the service sheet.
- Child-Friendly Morning Tea: Keep long-life items handy like Milo or Juice Boxes—simple, affordable, and helps children feel welcome.

Estimated Costs (once-off or annual):

• Twistable crayons: \$10

Quiet toys (e.g., 2–3 beanie bears): ~\$30

Stickers for special occasions: ~\$30

• Books: \$50

Colouring printouts and morning tea options: Minimal ongoing cost

Total: Approx. \$120, plus B&W printing and morning tea.

Even the smallest churches can be ready to bless our youngest visitors and their families. Welcoming children doesn't need to be complicated or expensive —just intentional.
