Introduction

We come to know, understand and love people when we spend time with them - listening, talking, engaging, sometimes arguing, and sometimes sitting in silence. That's what prayer is about - knowing, understanding and loving God. Feeling that God knows understands and loves each one of us.

This little book of prayers is a good starting point for prayer.

Every person prays differently and there is no right or wrong way to pray. Just try it and see what works for you. Sometimes the prayers of other people can help us focus our hearts and minds on prayer. Sometimes it's silence or music or beauty that stimulates us to pray. Sometimes our anger or shock or sadness asks us to pray. Sometimes prayer is just "being" in a special place.

As the old NIKE shoe promotion used to say, Just do it!

Getting Ready to Pray



Pray without ceasing

Cultivate the awareness that God accompanies you every day and quietly share with him the things that occupy your day.

A special place to pray

It is helpful to have somewhere that you use every day- a quiet place in your home, a comfy chair, a place where you feel safe.

Using your parish church

If your parish church is open through the week, you might like to sit quietly with God in your church or light a candle as you offer your prayers.

The Lord's Prayer

The prayer as we use it today is a version that was adapted by the early Christian communities from the two Gospel texts, Matthew 6.9–13 and Luke 11.1–4. The final sentence is called the *doxology*. It is not part of the New Testament text, but was added very early in the life of the church, and is not always used.

Contemporary Version

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever.

Amen.

Traditional Version

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever Amen.

A Daily Cycle of Prayer

It is often helpful to set aside a regular time and place to pray every day. Some things that might help are:-

Using the diocesan intercession list.

This list is printed each month and comes with dNews or is available on the diocesan website. www.ballaratanglican.org.au.

We can pray together across the diocese for the Anglican church across the world and for our diocese.

Using the daily office

Using the daily office from your prayer book (or the easiest option is to get the app on your phone). This provides a structure for your prayer life.

• It is helpful to have a daily rhythm of prayer. Many people often use the ACTS acronym.

Adoration; acknowledge the wonder of God.

Confession; be humble enough to accept that we get things wrong.

Thanksgiving; give thanks for life, and be particular about the goodness in your life.

Supplication (for others and yourself); ask for help from God. Pray for what you need.

- An option that could be used is
 - # In the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

My Lord and my God.

Glory be to the Father who has made me Glory be to the Son who has redeemed me Glory be to the Holy Spirit who gives me life Praise be to the Holy and undivided Trinity.

- # I am sorry that I have failed to do your will so often, especially for ... Send your Holy Spirit into my heart and guard me when I am tempted. Give me such joy in the triumphant sacrifice of your Son that it may overflow into the hearts and lives of all whom I meet.
- # Bless all who need your help: those in pain, the homeless, those suffering injustice and those tempted to do evil, the worried, the lonely and in despair, and all those who care for them.
- # Bless all whom I love ... and those whom I dislike ...
- # Guard them and watch over them today and always.
- # Give me, Lord, courage, strength and endurance to resist evil and to be loving and helpful in all I do.
- # Father, I thank you for all you have given me: for everyone and everything I love: for my freedom to enjoy and serve you in your world, and to share in your life.
- # Lord, may you bless and keep me and grant me your peace for ever.

Some Favourite Prayers

All-powerful God, you are present in the whole universe and in the smallest of your creatures.

The Apostle's Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty creator of heaven and earth and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. On the third day he rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God, the Father almighty; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead. Praying the Psalms

Many people find praying the psalms a helpful addition to their prayer life. The psalm writers experience the full range of human emotions.

For example:

- Ps 8 O lord our Sovereign,

 How majestic is your name in all the earth!

 You have set your glory above the heavens...
- Ps 25. To you, O Lord, I lift up my soul. O my God, in you I trust; Never let me be put to shame.....
- Ps 89. I will sing of your steadfast love, O Lord, Forever I will proclaim your faithfulness...
- Ps 102 Hear my prayer O Lord,
 Let my cry come to you.
 Do not hide your face from me in the day of my distress.
 Incline your ear to me,
 Answer me speedily in the day when I call...

Hymns as Prayers

The words of many hymns are prayers. Try using the words from your favourite hymns as prayers. eg

Be thou my vision,
O Lord of my heart,
Be all else but naught to me,
Save that thou art;
Be thou my best thought
In the day and the night,
Both waking and steeping,
Thy presence my light.



Praying Without Words

The psalmist reminds us "To be still and know that I am God."

Our best prayer times can often be the times when we come and sit in silence before God.

Sometimes this will be in your favourite armchair, in a garden or in your favourite place. It often helps by sitting quietly and doing some deep breathing. Some people find saying a mantra helps them focus on God. Eg Maranatha (come Lord Jesus), God be merciful to me, a sinner. This time of quiet is a time when we open ourselves to hear God's words for us.
